*The economic circumstances that have affected the country have definitely trickled down to New York State, and then to the municipalities. This has also affected the city's ability to fund capital purchases. Our police department, in conjunction with needs of the fire department, submitted a request to replace a very aged mobile command vehicle. The first year the request was made, it simply did not make it into the capital budget. The need was definitely great, but choices had to be made. The following year, the police department revived the request. The city agreed that the vehicle needed replacement, but since the vehicle is used multi jurisdictionally throughout the county and on a major university campus, it was suggested that the police department seek out supportive funding.*

*The Triad Foundation stepped up to the task and offered approximately 25% of the funding. The city supported 50% of the funding. The Triad Foundation offered to find additional contributions, as did the city. With the buzz word of intermunicipal cooperation and cost sharing, this vehicle purchase was the first with such a unique cost sharing structure. The leadership of the Triad Foundation enabled the city to purchase this vehicle, contributing to public safety in our community in a time when funds are very scarce.*

*For example, the Barr Foundation is a private foundation with a long history of supporting both community organizations and city initiatives. In their most recent strategic plan, the Barr Foundation will concentrate funding on two issues critical to the city's success: education and climate change. Barr has become a critical partner through its funding of the Boston Public School system, alternative educational approaches, early education, and out-of-school programs. In addition, Barr focuses resources on mitigating climate change, concentrating on building energy efficiency through retrofits, comprehensive planning and zoning reform, and high-quality transportation options.*

*The Boston Foundation, the city's community foundation, similarly is dedicated to the well being of Boston and its citizens. The foundation fully embraced Mayor Menino's challenge of doubling the college completion rate for the Boston Public Schools class of 2011 and launched Success Boston, the city's college achievement initiative. The Boston Foundation leads this challenge, providing funding and research, and convening the public schools, local college and universities, the Boston Private Industry Council, and nonprofit youth agencies in support of a single goal: ensuring Boston's youth are ready to enter and succeed in college.*
